Florida's Puerto Rican Diaspora

Findings and Recommendations from a statewide survey

March 2019

Survey Methodology


- A statewide survey of 600 likely November 2020 Puerto Rican Voters in Florida was conducted March 12-20, 2019 via landlines and cellphones among professional interviewers.
- The margin of error for the statewide sample is +/- 4.0 percentage points at the 95% level of confidence. The margin of error for subgroups varies and is higher.
- ≥86% of interviews were conducted via cell phone.



POLITICAL ENVIRONMENT

A slim majority of Florida Puerto Ricans lean Democratic in party registration (50%) and self-identification (53%).

Roughly one-third of likely 2020 Puerto Rican voters are registered as no party affiliation – a number that continues to increase over time.




However, a plurality of Florida Puerto Ricans say they are not tied to either mainstream political party.

Older Puerto Ricans are more supportive of Democrats, while a majority of younger Puerto Ricans and those in

the Miami market are not committed to either party.


Thinking about U.S. elections, do you typically support the Democratic Party and their candidates, do you typically support the Republican party and their candidates, or are you not at all committed to either party?


Florida's Puerto Rican diaspora view Rick Scott favorably by a double-digit margin, while views on Marco Rubio are evenly divided.

Ocasio-Cortez and Soto are viewed favorably by those who can rate them.



Reps. Gonzalez and Velázquez, as well as Gov. Rosselló have a net favorable image among Puerto Ricans statewide.


Unsurprisingly, Trump is heavily underwater among Puerto Ricans, as 6-in-10 have a "very unfavorable" view of the President.



The majority of Puerto Ricans supported Nelson in 2018, though Scott received support from nearly 3-in-10 Puerto Ricans. Older voters and those in the Tampa

markets were less supportive of Nelson.



A solid majority of Florida Puerto Ricans backed Gillum for Governor. Gillum outpaced Nelson's margins – particularly among Puerto Rican women and NPAs.

And in the 2018 election for Governor, did you vote for Democrat Andrew Gillum, or Republican Ron DeSantis?





CONDITIONS IN PUERTO RICO

Virtually all Florida Puerto Ricans think it's important that 2020 candidates focus on solutions to revive Puerto Rico's economy. Conditions on the island matter in vote choice.


Excessive taxes have overburdened Puerto Ricans and Puerto Rican owned businesses, hurting jobs and the local economy. Excessive local taxation stagnates

Corruption and incompetence of all Puerto Rican governments is to blame for the current crisis in Puerto Rico.


Puerto Rico's status as a Commonwealth and not a U.S. State is the underlying cause for the Island's current crisis and living conditions.

Congress denying Puerto Ricans in the Island the same political and civil rights as other citizens is to blame for the current crisis in Puerto Rico.



A majority of the diaspora think that Congressional neglect of those in the island is a personal knock to Puerto Ricans who are mainland.

This sentiment also holds true among a majorities of NPAs and those who are persuadable on a generic ballot.





PUERTO RICO STATEHOOD

Support for statehood remains strong, backed by more than three-fourths of Puerto Ricans in Florida.

Strong statehood support holds true across gender, age, partisan, and regional lines.





Eight-in-ten Puerto Ricans say statehood is important in their 2020 vote and 71% are more likely to vote for a candidate who aggressively pushes for statehood.

Additionally, 73% of voters who are persuadable politically are more likely to vote for a pro-statehood candidate.


Thinking about how you might vote in the Congressional and Presidential elections in 2020, how important is it for your vote that a candidate supports statehood for Puerto Rico?


And regardless of their political party, would you be more or less likely to vote for a candidate who will work aggressively to achieve U.S. statehood for Puerto Rico?



Asked the same way, statehood now for Puerto Rico and Washington, D.C. are popular, although there's more intensity backing Puerto Rico statehood.




A Democratic candidate in 2020 could struggle to win the support of Florida Puerto Ricans if they are pro-D.C. statehood, but opposed to statehood for Puerto Rico. This stance is politically damaging across every Puerto Rican subgroup in Florida.

Thinking about your vote for Congress and President in 2020, would you be more or less likely to vote for a Democratic candidate who supports statehood for





- 40% are women < 50






ISSUE STANCES

The Florida diaspora is split on abortion and choice, with younger voters and those in Miami more likely to be pro-choice and older and GOP Puerto Ricans more likely to consider themselves pro-life.

Statement A: I consider myself "pro-life" – a child should be protected from the moment of pregnancy and all pregnancy must be carried out and safeguarded through birth.



Nearly 7-in-10 Florida Puerto Ricans are in favor of gun control and gun safety measures. Older and Democratic Puerto Ricans are staunch supporters of gun control.

Statement B: Firearms should be controlled and regulated to keep us safe. No one should be able to buy, own and carry any gun of their choosing, without safeguards.



Key Takeaways

- Support for statehood continues to be rock solid, across virtually every Puerto Rican subgroup in Florida.
- ➤ Throughout this survey, Puerto Ricans express the importance of statehood in their 2020 vote. Any candidate on the Florida ballot opposed to Puerto Rican statehood should prepare for political blowback.
- ➤ Puerto Ricans lean Democratic, but they are still a persuasion subgroup. We see that many lack affiliation with either political party, many like Senators Scott and/or Rubio, and Puerto Ricans in Florida are divided on the issue of abortion.
- ➤ Persuadable Puerto Ricans are very pro-statehood and admit they would resent a Democrat who backs D.C. statehood but opposes statehood status for Puerto Rico.
- > As our polling has shown over the last three years, Florida's Puerto Rican diaspora wants statehood now and wants to support pro-statehood candidates at the ballot box.
